Tree logo promotes ideas of spirituality, scripture, family, generational connection and strength of community.


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ROOTs message highlights wisdom and solutions within the community vs. "programs".

Building Relationships & Trust

- Leave your agenda & assumptions at the door
- Connect, engage, repeat
- Emphasize common interests/goals
- Demonstrate reciprocity & mutual benefit

Active Listening & Reflection

- Be present, observe, absorb
- Learn the language (of community,
 partners, policymakers, other stakeholders)

EQUITY!

Elevating & Promoting Community Wisdom

Humility

- Know the limits of your authority
- Honor non-traditional expertise

Power Sharing

- Respect the variations of power
- Democratize "the table"
- Build accountability into your infrastructure (e.g., strategic plans, budgets, boards, committees)



Historical Context



- The Shelby County Health
 Department has existed in some
 form since 1838 (think Yellow
 Fever Epidemic).
- Birth and death certificates were color categorized by race up until at least 1968.
- Vital records were fully electronic by the late 1990s.



Health Context

- Top 3 causes of death (SC total, African American, and White)
 - Heart disease
 - Malignant neoplasms
 - COVID-19
- Top 10 causes of death are varied past the first 3
 - Homicide is #8 for the SC population overall, and #6 for the African American SC population. It does not rank in the top 10 causes for the White SC population.



Health Context

DEATHS PER 100,000 POPULATION: 2020			
Homicide		COVID-19	
SC Total	30.23	SC Total	99.14
African American	47.99	African American	108.16
White	4.40	White	84.15
Represents a 990% difference between AAs and Whites, and reveals that AAs were 10 times more likely to die from homicide		Represents a 28.5% difference between AAs and Whites, and reveals that AAs were 1.3 times more likely to die from COVID-19

Defining and Addressing Structural Racism

- Shining a light on root causes is necessary
 - Defining structural racism outside of a whisper...
 - "The colors had consequences!" Those consequences are still pervasive throughout the system.
- Systems change is uncomfortable
 - Centering community voice requires this discomfort be overcome
- Common language is key
 - Discussion of and agreement to use common language
 - Use of "justice-involved youth" vs. "juvenile"; Use of "community expert" vs.
 "key informant"
